OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS

FUTURE TEACHER INTERNSHIP students will have the opportunity to work with a teacher(s) in various classroom settings to investigate career options in the Education and Training Career Cluster—Teaching/Training Pathway. Students will have a two period assignment, four days a week for a semester to work in an assigned classroom. The fifth day will be for students to attend seminars on tutoring, applying to the university, collaborating with other future teacher interns, learning about professional organizations and professional learning communities, interacting with students, collaborating with mentor teacher(s), and meeting program learning targets.

HEALTH CAREER CONNECTIONS offers internships at area healthcare facilities designed to familiarize students with the various careers in the medical profession. Students will learn skills necessary for their health care career pathway. In addition to working with others, students will learn about the legal and ethical responsibilities, and cultural considerations in the health care industry. Students intending to enroll in Health Career Connections should register for DC Medical Terminology (793), Medical Professionalism (797), and Anatomy and Physiology (113 or 114) in their junior year. Nursing Assistant certification will be required between junior and senior year through the technical college system.

NOTE: To apply for Health Career Connections you must complete a program application and interview with employers at the beginning of your junior year.

INTERNSHIP is designed to prepare learners for the process of gaining and maintaining employment. Learners assess their personal background; practice finding career opportunities through the job search process; develop a cover letter, resume, thank you letter, and complete a job application; participate in a mock interview; and demonstrate how to deal with interpersonal situations found in a work environment. Students earn credit for their paid work experience and classroom instruction.


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YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP AT MARSHFIELD HIGH SCHOOL

Wisconsin's **YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP (YA)** program is a part of a statewide School-to-Work initiative. This career-based learning program is designed for high school juniors and seniors who want hands on learning in an occupational area at a worksite along with classroom instruction. This one or two year elective program combines academic and technical instruction with mentored onthe-job learning. A minimum of 2 semesters of related classroom instruction is required for each one year YA program.

BENEFITS OF YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP

- Begin your career pathway in high school
- Get paid to learn from skilled professionals
- Develop the skills needed for entry-level employment
- Earn a state-issued skills certificate that is recognized by employers
- Experience what it's like to work in the real world
- After graduation, move straight into the workforce, registered apprenticeship, or continue your education in college



STEPS TO YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP

- 1. Apply for desired YA program in the Spring of Sophomore year, Junior year, or Senior year.
- 2. Interview for position.
- 3. Once hired, complete YA registration paperwork.
- 4. Work with the Career and Technical Education Coordinator and your school counselor for related classroom instruction.
- Begin YA program—Youth Apprenticeship requires a commitment of approximately 15 hours per week—a total of 450 hours for one-year Youth Apprenticeship, 900 hours for a two-year Youth Apprenticeship.
- 6. Participate in quarterly evaluations with your employer and Career and Technical Education Coordinator.

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
