Marshfield High School Mock Trial Advances to State Contest

The Marshfield Mock Trial team will be going to state for the third year in a row after their second place finish on Saturday the 10th's regional competition in Wausau. The team competed against 14 other teams losing only to their 3rd round competitors of DC Everest.

Mock trial is a speech-based competition where teams are asked to prepare an argument based on case materials given to them in October. Once at competition teams must present their defense or plaintiff arguments depending on what is asked for each round of the competition. Each side must present 3 witnesses led by 3 attorneys. The attorneys lead their witnesses in direct examinations creating a narrative for the case, the witnesses are then cross examined by the opposing attorneys in an attempt to break down their arguments.

This year the case was centered around a vandalism that occurred at an iron mining site in Clearwater WI. The defendant Jessie Green was accused of spray painting the phrase "we are water" as well as pouring sugar into the hydraulic system of a mobile mining crusher. Jessie's argument was supported by two other witnesses the security guard Charlie Baker and Jessie's friend Bobbi Markings. The plaintiff was on the side of the Iron mining company and was supported by the mechanic Karl Campbell, the private investigator Ellis Gran, and another security guard Perry Blart.

The team of 10 this year consisted of two time-keepers, three graduating seniors, three juniors, and two sophomores. All of the seniors have competed for three or more years, and previous teammates have gone on to compete in college level Mock Trial. The night before the competition the team got together to eat pizza and watch Monty Python and the Holy Grail, after cleansing themselves from the last years competition the team was ready for a fresh start.

The team will be competing at the state competition in Madison on March 9th, 10th, and 11th against teams from all areas of the state. Competition begins at 4 o'clock on that Friday with the final round Sunday morning.
