This year is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the MHS building. The first class graduated from our current location in 1969. We celebrate this milestone for our building by recognizing all past and current educators who have continued the tradition of excellence in education within the Marshfield School District. We would like to recognize the original architects of the MHS building - John J. Flad and Associates Architects Engineers. We would also like to recognize the members of the Marshfield Board of Education at the time the building was built. We want to inform you of some important dates coming up for MHS. Parent/Teacher conferences will take place on Monday, November 12, 2018, Wednesday, November 14, 2018 and Monday, April 8, 2019. There was a change in the April date since the beginning of the year, so please be sure to note the change in your calendar as well. We will also have Tiger Course Hunt Night on Monday, February 18, 2019. All of these events will run from 3:30 PM to 7:30 PM. School safety is always a priority for us. We will continue to have the mandated drills that are required by State Statue throughout the year. # SPECIAL ATTENDANCE CONSIDERATIONS FOR SENIORS

This is the third year we are operating under the new senior attendance policy that was approved by the Board of Education in the spring of 2015. As we move into quarter two, there are a number of seniors whose absence rate suggests that their graduation ceremony status will be impacted by this policy. The policy can be reviewed on page 35 of the student handbook/planner. Seniors who miss 20 or more days of school will not be eligible to participate in the graduation ceremony and Project Graduation unless they make the time up through community service. Students reaching this threshold prior to April 1st of their senior year will be assigned community service with Marshfield Clinic's Youth Net Program. Seniors reaching this threshold after April 1st will be required to perform community service at alternate locations and provide documentation to the high school. All community service locations must be approved in advance by the high school administration and completed prior to the graduation ceremony. Students who exceed the 20 day threshold after May 1st may be required to complete in-school suspension during the week prior to the date of graduation. Upon successful completion of the community service component or in-school suspension, participation in the graduation ceremonies will be allowed. Seniors are encouraged to monitor their attendance as we proceed through the academic year.

# **"TOP TIGER" Recognition Program**

We will be continuing our Top Tiger program this year. As part of our Positive Behavior Intervention & Supports (PBIS) we implemented some positive student recognition programs. We will continue to do the same this year through our "Top Tiger" recognition program. Each week two students are nominated by their teachers (departments) for this award. The criteria to be a Top Tiger is one of these: 1) student shows outstanding academic achievement, 2) student has overcome an obstacle and is working toward a successful school year, 3) student shows great respect and compassion for fellow students and staff, or 4) student is a leader in a positive, healthy lifestyle. The nominated students are recognized each week and have their photo taken and displayed outside the main office. The Top Tigers also receive a gift card, have a special parking spot for the week, have their names read over the public-address system, and a congratulatory letter is sent home. The selected students so far this year have really enjoyed being named a "Top Tiger. Thanks for all of your support. Academics + Co-curricular = Success. We're in this together!

# SCRIP PROGRAM



SCRIP is a fundraising opportunity run by Parents on Campus, that is of no extra cost to anyone involved. We buy gift certificates to numerous local and national stores that we then sell to you at face value. The fundraising opportunity comes by us being able to purchase these certificates at a discounted price. We then will split the profit made 50/50. For example: you buy \$20.00 in Weiler's gas certificates from us for exactly \$20.00. We, on the other hand, have purchased that certificate for only \$18.00. # **Medications to be Taken at School**

The school district's medication policy allows students in grades 7-12 to self-administer over the counter medications as long as active parental consent is on file in the main office. We ask that the medication be kept in the properly labeled container and only a minimal amount of medication be brought to school.

Reliable students in grades 7-12 may also self-administer certain prescription medications with written parental consent and physician's authorization on file. Please be aware that the school district's medication policy requires all controlled substances, such as Ritalin, Adderall, Vicodin, Codeine, etc., to be administered by trained staff members. <u>Under no circumstances may a student have controlled substances in his</u> <u>or her possession at school</u>.

# Flu Season is Around the Corner!

From the School District Nurses, Tammy Voss & Judy Akin:

Protect yourself and your family this season with an annual flu vaccine for everyone in your family who is 6 months of age and older. While the timing of flu season is unpredictable, seasonal flu activity can begin as early as October and last as late as May. CDC recommends that people get vaccinated by the end of October, if possible.



Take everyday actions to stop the spread of germs. Try to avoid close contact with sick people, and if you become sick, limit your contact with others. Stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone. Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze, and wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.

Get your flu vaccine today! It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body that protect against influenza virus infection.

If you do get the flu, contact your medical provider. Prescription medicine called antiviral drugs can be used to treat flu. Antiviral drugs can make illness milder and shorten the time you are sick. They may also prevent serious flu complications.

You have the power to protect your family against flu this season. Get yourself and your family a flu vaccine.

# ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE SCHOLARSHIPS

The three MHS seniors who have the highest cumulative grade point average in their class based on seven semesters of high school work are eligible for an Academic Excellence Scholarship. These scholarships are sponsored by the Higher Education Aids Board of Wisconsin.

The scholarships cover a portion of tuition at all state universities and vocational/technical colleges, and a percentage of the tuition at all Wisconsin private colleges and universities. Seniors who are eligible for the scholarships must attend post-secondary educational institutions in the state of

Wisconsin. If they choose to attend out of state, the scholarship will be forfeited.

You should be aware that class rank at MHS is based on cumulative grade point average and cumulative mark points or cumulative weighted credits. Because of this, the students qualifying to receive the Academic Excellence Scholarships are not necessarily the same students who are ranked number one, two, or three in their class.

The festivities will take place in the Great Hall of the High School (Commons), and we will begin promptly at 5:00 PM. The seven-course meal will feature Cornish game hen. ### A Reminder From the District Nurses

The return to school can also mean more illnesses to deal with at home. Some illnesses are contagious, and a return to school too soon can cause a spread of the illness. If your child is placed on antibiotics to treat an illness, please keep him or her out of school until 24 hours of antibiotic therapy has been completed. If you have questions regarding the length of time for the absence, please call the district nurse (384-4747) for additional information.

Also, be sure to notify the school office if your child is going to be absent due to illness.



# POSSESSION OF A FIREARM

Wisconsin Statute 120.13(1)c.2m states that school boards shall commence proceedings and expel a pupil from school for not less than one year whenever it finds that a student, while at school or on the school grounds, possessed a firearm as defined in 18 USC 921 (a)(3). The school board may modify the requirement of "one year" on a case-by-case basis.

After reading this law, a first impression may be that it protects the health



and safety of our students. And it does that! But for those students who have taken and passed the hunter safety course, and their parents have given them permission to hunt before or after school, those weapons cannot be brought on school grounds, EVEN IF EN-CASED AND SECURED IN A VEHICLE. There is no exception. Firearms or ammunition cannot be brought on school grounds at any time. If you have questions, please contact an administrator.

### Where do I Find Information About School Closings for Inclement Weather? 9-12

The answer is simple. We will use the Blackboard Connect system to call you at home when school is cancelled for the day. You can also listen to WDLB Radio (1450 am) for school closing information. Other radio stations probably will not have the information pertaining to school closings in the Marshfield School District.

Changes in athletic practice times or cancellation of an athletic event will also be announced on WDLB.

Parents are asked to make plans ahead of time so your student will know what to do in the event school is dismissed early. We have a hard time handling the hundreds of messages we receive on early closing days; many times students don't hear their name called to pick up their message.

### Open School Enrollment Application Dates for 2019-2020



If you are anticipating moving out of the Marshfield School District before July 1, 2019, and would like your child to attend Marshfield High School next year, you are required to submit an Open Enrollment Application to the Board of Education between February 4 thru April 30, 2019 at 4:00 PM. Application forms can be filled out at <u>https://apps4.dpi.wi.gov/Opal2012</u>. If you move after February 1, 2019, a tuition waiver form must be filled out for your child to attend the remainder of the current school year and attend for the 2019-20 school year. Contact Tacey Doine or Anne Barlow at the Board of Education 715-387-1101, ext. 1109.

# PRE- 912 ARRANGED ABSENCES FOR STUDENTS

Any student desiring a pre-arranged absence (**must be gone for <u>3 or</u> <u>more</u> days**) for such things as vacation, out of town trips, hunting, etc., must follow the following procedure: A parent or guardian must send a note to give full details pertaining to the proposed absence.

No more than three days before the absence start date students can begin to circulate a form to all teachers apprising them of the length of absence, dates of absence, etc. Teachers will designate specific assignments due upon the student's return to school.

A reminder that parents are allowed to excuse their child for any reason for 10 days per school year. A prearranged absence is included in these 10 days. After 10 days, a note from a medical professional will be required to excuse any further absences. The notes must indicate that the student was seen in person. If the 10th day is reached during this absence, the remaining days will be recorded as unexcused.

# MHS Drama Club Presents: PETER AND THE STARCATCHER

The classic tale of *Peter Pan* has captured the hearts of children and parents alike for years. Now a prequel to the story, based on a young adult novel, is gracing the stage at MHS on Friday, Nov. 9<sup>th</sup> and Saturday, Nov. 10<sup>th</sup>. *Peter and the Starcatcher* answers all the questions about *Peter Pan* you've always wondered about. ### FACT SHEET FOR PARENTS

### **Tdap Requirements for Middle and High School Students**

The Wisconsin Student Immunization law requires that all students entering the 6th grade receive a dose of Tdap vaccine. To be compliant with the school law, parents must provide their child's school with proof of immunization or claim a waiver.

1. What is Tdap?

Tdap is a vaccine that protects against Tetanus, Diphtheria, and Pertussis (whooping cough).

2. What grades are affected and what vaccine is required?

All students entering grades 6 through 12 must have one dose of Tdap.

3. What do parents need to do?



Have your child vaccinated with Tdap vaccine if he or she has not already received the vaccine. Record the date of the immunization in the appropriate box on the enclosed Student Immunization Record, sign the form and return it to your child's school. Be sure to add the Tdap vaccination date to the permanent immunization record you keep for your child. In the future, your child may need to give these dates to other schools, colleges or employers. To claim a waiver for health, religious or personal conviction reasons, follow the instructions on the Student Immunization Record and return the signed form to your child's school.

- 4. Are there exceptions to the Tdap vaccine requirements? Yes. If you child has received a tetanus-containing vaccine (such as Td) in the five years before he/she enters the grade in which it is required, your child is compliant and is not required to receive a Tdap. Check the box marked "Td" on the Student Immunization Record, enter the date it was received and return the signed form to school.
- 5. Once my child meets the Tdap requirement will he or she need to get another dose in a different grade? No. Tdap is a one-time requirement. Once a child meets the vaccine requirement for the grade to which the requirement applies, no further doses are required. In other words, a student who receives Tdap before starting 6th grade does not need any more doses. If a child received a dose of Td vaccine within 5 years of entering 6th grade, that child has met the Tdap requirement (even though s/he has not actually received Tdap vaccine) and will not be required to receive Tdap vaccine now or in a future grade.
- 6. If my child already had pertussis (whooping cough) disease, should he or she still get the Tdap vaccine? A history of pertussis disease is not an exception to the Tdap requirement. Children who have had pertussis should still receive Tdap because the length of protection provided by the disease is unknown and because the diagnosis can be difficult to confirm in some instances.

#### 7. Where can I get Tdap vaccine for my child?

Tdap is available from your child's medical provider, local health departments and some pharmacies. Please have your child immunized well in advance of school opening to avoid the late summer rush as doctor's offices and immunization clinics.

#### 8. Why is Tdap required?

Pertussis is a serious disease. It can easily be passed from person-to-person and can cause outbreaks in schools. Wisconsin has experienced two state-wide pertussis outbreaks in the past 10 years. People who are ill with pertussis must stay home from work or school for at last five days. Studies have shown that the protection gained from the DTP/DTaP vaccines received as a young child begins to decline 5 to 10 years after vaccination; the Tdap vaccine will boost that immunity and help protect your adolescent from pertussis.

**9.** Are there any other vaccines that are recommended for my adolescent? Yes. There are three other vaccines that are routinely recommended for teens. The Human Papillomavirus Vaccine (HPV) vaccine protects against a virus that is a common cause of cancer. The meningococcal conjugate vaccine protects against meningococcal disease (meningitis), and an annual influenza vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months of age and older.
