Marshfield High School is excited to announce that we will be utilizing an automated telephone answering system starting on Monday, April 8, 2019. Starting daily at 8:40 AM we will have an automated menu for callers to choose from that will assist in routing their calls to the correct individual or department.

With spring also (typically) comes senioritis. Please remember that seniors are excused prior to the end of the school year to begin with. As parents please do not encourage or approve additional days for "senior skip days". Their focus at the end of the year needs to be on academics and finishing the year strong! The final transcript becomes a historical document that gives a picture of an entire high school career; seniors are encouraged to end it with an accurate picture of their abilities. Also remember that senior pranks are not a rite of passage or an acceptable tradition. They often cause people additional work, are harmful to others or pose a safety concern for the building. Please keep in mind that senior pranks will come with appropriate school consequences, which could include losing the privilege of participating in the graduation ceremony.

On Monday, May 20, 2019, all seniors will be attending a half-day Sexual Assault Resistance program called "Safety After High School." This program will be presented at MHS by the Personal Development Center, school staff, and other community experts. Students will learn personal safety techniques to help adjust to adult life. This is the fourth year that the program has been offered, and I believe this information is vital as our seniors stand at the edge of adulthood.

ATTENTION! ATTENTION!! ATTENTION!!! SPRING TESTING FOR FRESHMEN AND SOPHOMORES

Beginning the week of April 8 and ending on April 19, MHS will administer the state mandated ACT Aspire Early High School assessment to all freshman and sophomores. The ACT Aspire is an online assessment with 5 subtests, including Reading, English, Math, Science and Writing. The score report will illustrate demonstrated growth in each area and provide an accurate prediction of each student's score range on the ACT college readiness assessment, which is an important criteria for university and technical college admission. The scores are also used to identify students who may benefit from specific interventions in reading and/or math while they are still in high school. The Writing subtest will be administered on one day during the week of April 8 during each student's regularly schedule English class. Sophomore will complete the writing test on 4/8 or 4/9, freshman on 4/11 or 4/12. The remaining 4 subtests are scheduled for the following week, with freshman on 4/15 and 4/17, sophomores on 4/16 and 4/18. Students will complete the assessment using their iPads with keyboards, chromebooks, or computer lab workstations.

The ACT Aspire allows accommodations for students with disabilities who have IEPs or 504 plans. Students with these accommodations will have varied test locations and schedules. Case managers and counselors will provide specific scheduling information to these students during the week of April 1.

Parents can support this process by making their best effort to insure that their student is present, gets adequate sleep and eats breakfast on their test day. Students who are absent on test days will participate in make-up testing during the week of 4/22. APPROPRIATE DRESS

School policy states that "While fashions change, the reason for being in school does not. Students are in school to learn. Any fashion (dress, accessory, or hairstyle) that disrupts the educational process or presents a safety risk will not be permitted. If a student has selected a manner of appearance that is beyond mere freedom of expression and disrupts the educational process or presents risk to themselves or others, they may be removed from the educational setting." (Please see page 24 of the student planner for the dress code.)

Of particular concern are short shorts (<u>shorts are to be no higher than mid-thigh</u>), low cut blouses, and exposed midriffs or undergarments. This also includes boys wearing their pants too low. Such situations can be distracting and can lead to unwelcome comments. Please remember that the MHS administration has the right to determine the appropriateness of clothing and can send a student home for violating the dress code. Please help us avoid these situations by discussing appropriate dress with your student.

News From the Athletic Director

As we return from Spring Break this year there is just a different feeling about Spring possibly being here. The Tax Day Snowstorm of 2018 is well behind us. But then again, this is what I wrote one year ago, "The last few days have been very promising for this Spring that hopefully everyone will be outside when we return in April." Hopefully there is no foreshadowing this Spring.

Our athletes performed well this winter and represented our school, families, and communities with class. All teams showed great improvement over the winter season. A few things of now: Wrestling won the Regional, Team Sectional, and Wrestled in the State Semi-Finals. Gymnastics was the Runner-Up at Sectional and qualified for state for the first time as a school. This year saw a rare feat: two WIAA State Champions. Sam Mitchell in Wrestling at 195 lbs and Gracie Holland on Vault and was the All-Around Champion in Gymnastics. All Conference teams and season records can be found at www.valleystats.org. But now we turn our focus to the spring.

On behalf of our school, students, and staff, thank you for your commitment to the Building on a Tradition of Excellence Capital Campaign, which is improving Athletic Facilities in our district. My hope is many of you have noticed the great progress that has been made on our Athletic Facilities Construction Projects by the Boson Company and Retter Cooperation. Dugouts, Press Boxes, and the Concession Stand can be seen as you drive down Becker Rd and will be finished in the near future. In the coming weeks, the retention wall will be completed, and the bleacher system will begin to be erected. It is exciting and sometimes inconvenient times on campus. We appreciate your patience and support. The end result will be state of the art facilities for our students and community. Thank you again.

Here are some reminders as we get into another very busy season:

- Our practice in Marshfield and Central Wisconsin has been to avoid Wednesdays when scheduling contests to avoid conflicts with religious beliefs and family obligations. I/We will do our best to find dates that honor this past practice, however with shared fields, daylight, opponent conflicts, high official demand, athlete rest, required contests, and finite deadlines we will be using every date, except Sunday to reschedule contests. We appreciate your understanding and support navigating each spring.
- May 22nd at 7:00pm we will honor our Senior Student Athletes as they come to the end of their careers. This is a good night for our Athletes, Coaches, and Parents to remember the good and challenging times of their experience as a Tiger.
- Athletes who won't be using school provided transportation to return home from sporting events are required to give the school oneday notice and must fill out the Non-Use of School Provided Transportation Form. Forms are available in the high school office, from the coach or on the MHS website under the forms section. Parents must complete the form, prior to the Athletic Director/ Principal signing it.
- Listen to WDLB, like us on Facebook (MHS Tiger Athletics), follow us on Twitter (@mfldathletics) or register for notifications from the Wisconsin Valley Conference website (www.wisconsinvalleyconference.org) for all schedules, related cancellations, and schedule changes.
- All student-athletes are to be in attendance each day, particularly days of events and the next morning regardless of length of trip and when they returned home the previous night. They are students first and there are some concessions that have to be made, being in class each day is one of them.
- The Marshfield Tiger Booster Club Golf Outing has as a new date. Date is June 28, 2019 at RiverEdge Golf Course. Grab friends or co-workers and enjoy the end of the work week with Tiger Fans and some golf.
- 2019-20 Athletic Registration will be completed online.
- 2019-20 Tiger Cards will be on sale in mid-August. Your teams raised over \$40,000 last fall. The 100% increase comes from your support and it is greatly appreciated by them all. The efforts and support of our athletes and the community this last year allowed our athletes to focus more on training and less on fundraising throughout the remainder of the year.

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SUMMER SCHOOL

YEAR-END 9-12 OBLIGATIONS

When you receive your son/daughter's report card in June, you will also receive notification of any obligations your child may owe to the High School. These could include money due for books (lost or damaged), library fines, band/athletic uniforms & supplies, art and technology class fees, user or athletic fees. Fees that are due are viewable in Skyward and are updated as they are submitted by staff. Keep checking Skyward.

noon. Both meals will be offered free of charge. Occasionally students and families discover scheduling conflicts and decide not to attend summer school. If this is your situation, please contact Renee Burkhart at 715-387-4332, as soon as possible to let her know. Many classes are full and have waiting lists with students who would be very happy to get your vacated slot. Here is some other important summer information:

- 1. Parents are requested to call all absences in using the Counseling Office phone number, 715-387-4332. If no answer please leave a message on extension #1.
- 2. Students are expected to initiate contact with their teacher after being absent to find out what they need to make up.
- 3. Students enrolled in classes for high school credit will not be granted credit if more than 5 absences are recorded for any reason. Five recorded tardies equals one entire absence. Any tardy in excess of 30 minutes will also be counted as one complete day towards the five day maximum.
- 4. Summer school grades can be monitored on Skyward just like the regular school year. Summer school final grades will be calculated immediately into students' GPAs, but class rank will not be recalculated until after semester 1. Summer school report cards will be mailed home in early August. The administrative contact person for summer school is Jackson Hein, Assistant Principal at Marshfield High School, 715-387-8464, ext. 4204.

- Decide which college you will attend next fall and notify the other schools that you will not be attending by May 1 in writing, especially if you have sent in housing or tuition deposits.
- Request that your final (eight semesters) transcript be sent by the counseling office to the school you will be attending. The counselors will come to senior English classes to give students the proper paperwork for this final transcript request.
- Take required college placement tests and turn in required registration information.
- If you receive a scholarship, bring the letter to your counselor. You will then be recognized at the Awards Program which will be held on Wednesday, May 29th at 7:00 p.m. in the Auditorium.



SAFETY AFTER HIGH SCHOOL

On Monday, May 20, all seniors will be participating in a half-day Sexual Assault Resistance Program called Safety After High School. This program is a joint effort between the Personal Development Center (PDC), the Marshfield Police Department, local self-defense experts, and school staff. Seniors will be given information regarding sexual assault awareness and preven-

tion, personal safety techniques, and real-life practicing of selfdefense techniques. Participants will be provided pizza and a small token at the conclusion of the program.



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APTESTING 2019

AP Regular Exam testing will occur during the weeks of May 6 and May 13. While the regular registration deadline has passed, students can still register to take one or more AP Exams up until April 11, if they pay a \$20 late fee. After April 11th the late fee increases to \$55 (excluding alternate exam orders). April 19^h is the final deadline to order regular AP Exams. Students who have registered for an AP exam but decide not to take the exam, may apply for a partial refund of \$79. See Mrs. Guldan or Mrs. Burkhart in the counseling office to apply for this refund. All students taking one or more AP exams must attend a Pre-Administration Meeting. At these meetings AP test takers will complete paperwork that must be done **PRIOR** to the official test session. Ninth graders in AP Government will complete their pre-administration materials during regular class time. All other AP Testers will have 4 options to

attend sessions: April 15 & 23, at 7:00 a.m., and held in the Lecture Hall. If you don't attend a Pre **2019 AP EXAM SCHEDULE** -Administration Meeting you will be charged \$5 to come in and do it individually.

Test Dates, Times, and Locations

The main AP Test window will occur between May 6 and May 13. Students who have test conflicts or miss tests for legitimate reasons have the opportunity to make up tests on May 22-24. The tests days and times are set by the College Board and must be followed.

Most tests are given off campus at two locations, Eastgate Alliance Church at 2203 East Becker and Faith Lutheran Church at 207 S. Cherry. We use these off site test locations because they can provide a quiet test environment without disruption from the normal activities that occur at Marshfield High School. These test locations do not charge the Marshfield School District to use their facilities, and we have had an excellent working relationship with them due to the exemplary behavior of our AP students. We definitely want to keep this going.

A complete schedule for AP Testing with dates, times and locations is currently under construction and will be posted on the Advanced Placement page of the School District of Marshfield website and in the hallway next to the counseling office as soon as it is completed. A preliminary schedule is listed below; students should arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the posted start time of each exam. BIG CHANGES FOR THE 2019-2020 SCHOOL YEAR AND AP EXAM REGISTRATION



The College Board is changing when students will order AP Exams for the May 2020 administration. College Board research has shown that students are more engaged and likely to earn a score of 3 or higher on the AP Exam when they registered in the fall for AP Exams. Please see below for important information on what will change and what will not:

Changes for 2019-2020:

- Registration for AP Exams will occur online in October 2019 for yearlong AP classes. Second semester only AP classes will have exam registration at the beginning of second semester.
- No payment due until March 2020. Students who decide to cancel an AP Exam after November 15 will be charge a cancellation fee which is determined by the College Board.
- No pre-administration will be required, the high school will receive student ID stickers which will be placed on answer sheets.
- More instructional supports for students
- More access to AP student exam practice

Won't change for 2019-2020 AP Exam Season:

- Cost- each AP exam for 2020 will cost \$94
- Exams will be administered in the first two full weeks of May

STRESS IN THE TEEN YEARS

Stress in teens is an important health issue. It may be brought on by school pressure, part-time jobs, dating & friendships, peer pressure, body image concerns, family & peer conflicts, and busy schedules (school, sports, extra-curricular activities, social life, work, and family obligations). More than a quarter of teens experience what they consider "extreme stress" during the school year in particular. How teens cope with these stressors can have significant consequences to both their physical & emotional health.

In small doses, stress can be a good thing because it helps a person get things done. It can help teens rise to a challenge. However, if stress goes on too long or becomes severe, it can cause problems. Some signs that your teen may be suffering from stress include:

- Increased complaints of headache, stomachache, or other body aches
- Difficulty sleeping & tiredness
- Changes in appetite or eating habits
- Anger or irritability
- Crying more often than usual
- Withdrawal from people & activities
- Feelings of hopelessness
- Difficulty concentrating
- Sadness or anxiety

Fortunately, there are things that can be done to help teens manage their level of stress:

- Teach your teen to set small goals & break tasks into smaller, manageable chunks
- Encourage good sleeping habits
- Promote exercise & regular meals
- Remind your teen it is okay to let some things go
- Have them take deep breaths and practice strategies like progressive muscle relaxation
- Help them to recognize unrealistic expectations
- Give them permission to learn from mistakes
- Teach your teen how to problem solve
- Be available to talk with your teen
- Pay attention to the use of video games, television, the internet, & social media
- Seek help from a doctor, school psychologist, school counselor, school social worker, or school nurse who may have additional resources to help your child.

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NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY NEWS



Sophomores and juniors may qualify as candidates for National Honor Society membership if they have and maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 3.7, and pass character screening by school administration. NHS advisers will notify the candidates after grades for third quarter are posted. Candidates must then complete the following application requirements and deliver them to the NHS advisers at the high school by the due date:

1) Complete volunteer community service and submit documentation.

Seniors must complete 75 hours of community service, juniors must complete 50 hours. These hours of service must be rendered between June of the year preceding entrance to ninth grade and the year of candidacy. Copies of the list of potential volunteer opportunities and a log sheet for recording volunteer service are posted on the NHS bulletin board outside of the guidance department. Students may do volunteer work with an organization that is not on the list, and may document their hours on a sheet other than the suggested log sheet.

- 2) Submit three letters of recommendation: one from a teacher, one from a person who has supervised the community service volunteer work, and one letter from a community member who knows the applicant well. None of these recommendations may be made by a family member.
- 3) Demonstrate the qualities of leadership, responsibility, and integrity.

A committee will review the application materials and, in September, notify those candidates who qualify for membership. Each nominee will receive an invitation to the formal induction ceremony.

REMEMBER TO TURN IN APPOINTMENT VERIFICATION SLIPS

Parents are reminded that absences for medical or dental appointments can be exempted from the 10 days you are allowed to excuse your student simply by having your student turn in an appointment verification slip. This includes the reminder letter you receive from the clinic.

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
INTO THE WOODS

Into the Woods, the popular Stephen Sondheim musical that was adapted by Disney in a moviemusical in 2013, debuted on the MHS stage for the first time! The show is based around the wellknown stories of the Brothers Gimm fairytales, including Little Red Ridinghood and the Wolf, Jack and the Beanstalk, Rapunzel, Cinderella and her Stepsisters and the Prince, as well as the scary Witch known in so many other tales. The fairytale characters embark on their own personal journeys into the woods, along with a Baker and his wife who long to have a child. On their quests for self-fulfillment, they learn that sometimes there are consequences for the decisions made in life.

The musical is the fourth most popularly produced musicals by high schools across the United States, and features an ensemble cast that is inter-woven into this intricate story. As Act One proceeds, all seems to end happily – but when Act Two continues, we learn that life is not always made up with fairytale endings. A smart, witty and humorous show, this is a musical that it truly captivating for the audience as you immerse yourself in the Victorian-Age village and the edgy atmosphere of the woods.

The show consisted of 75+ students participating in cast, crew and pit, including a wide range of

performers from all grade levels: Eben Lonsdale, junior, performs as the narrator for the story; Anna Weis, sophomore, is the evil Witch neighbor to the Baker, played by senior Zach Iniguez, and the Baker's Wife, junior Riya Bolander; in addition, Cinderella is played by senior Paige Bulgrin; Jack, performed by freshman Tylan Cokl; Rapunzel is played by junior Kinsey Regehr, and the hilariously pompous Princes (everything you expect a Prince to be like) are performed by senior Jacob Gilbertson and junior Jarreth Schaefer. The show is directed by Amanda Leurquin, with music direction by Greg Reierson and Dave Carroll (pit conductor), and choreographed by Joelle Clark. This is also the fourth year the MHS Drama Club has participated in the Jerry Awards Program with the Overture Center for the Arts Center in Madison, with evaluators around the state coming to view the production, critique, nominate and ultimately, award students and adults for their achievement with the musical theatre program at our high school. Last year, Zachary Iniguez won a Jerry Award for Outstanding Performance playing 'Moonface Martin' in Anything Goes along with Amanda Leurquin receiving Outstanding Direction.

NEGATIVE BALANCE POLICY

For elementary students, no more than **three (3) charges** are allowed per student. If the family cannot be contacted by phone, a letter will be sent. After the 3rd charge, elementary students will be served a sandwich and water until the account is paid in full. The appropriate cost for the sandwich will be added to the family account. Negative balances that are unpaid throughout the year transfer to the next school year.

For middle and high school students, **<u>NO CREDIT</u>** will be extended, and students will **<u>not</u>** be permitted to eat unless adequate funds are available in their account.

It's a Match!

Pathway Partners Mentoring Program is one of a number of opportunities that Marshfield High School offers to students to promote connection with the community while gaining experience and confidence as students explore career choices.

Pathway Partners Mentoring Program, a United Way Partner Program, is a career focused mentoring program designed to assist Marshfield High School students explore their post high school career goals. Pathway Partners Mentoring Program is open to all students in all grade levels. To join, students simply complete a short application stating their career interests, personal interests and hobbies. After thoughtful consideration, an adult volunteer from the community who has been interviewed, screened and trained, is selected as a mentor. The selected mentor shares common interests with their mentee and perhaps works in the career field that the student is interested in pursuing. Mentors and mentees meet once a month during the school year. The mentor and mentee design their own relationship based on the student's interests, goals and availability. Meetings can occur at school or elsewhere in the community.

A simple statement such as "Tell me about yourself" from the mentor to the student, can be the beginning of a new friendship. The mentoring relationship allows the student to create a relationship with a completely new person. A student in Pathway Partners Mentoring Program shared this, "My mentor not only provided job shadowing opportunities for me, we also formed a friendship."

While career exploration is the goal, the relationship contains many hidden benefits such as improved self-esteem and confidence, as well as the myriad of new possibilities that this relationship holds. The mentor is not meant to replace the guidance of parents, teachers and counselors. The mentor's purpose is to be another adult available to support, encourage and guide the student during the high school experience.


