Literacy Keys

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Did You Know?

- * Spoken language is made up of a sequence of sounds.
- * Children need to know that words are speech written down (Tankersley, 2003).
- Early literacy begins at home.

Early Stages of Literacy

During the early stages of literacy, children develop their own ideas of what reading is and how it works (Clay, 2005). Many children need to be taught that in English words, sentences, paragraphs, and books begin on the left and move to the right. Likewise, they should start at the top of a page and move towards the bottom.

Literacy teachers call this directionality. When children lack this skill, it may look like children have other problems with reading like phonics, but this isn't always the case.

When children believe that letters can be moved or recombined within a word, they will struggle. An example is when a child begins reading the word am with the letter "m" first. The word they read is ma, rather than am.

To teach for directionality, ask your child where should they start reading, which way should they go, and where next? With practice your child should have control over this skill quickly.

To teach directionality within words tell your child that words are made up of a sequence of the sounds we hear when we talk. Then show your child in writing how you write the letters of a word in sequence. Teaching children phonics once they've learn this should be much

Practice Makes Progress: Linking Literacy to Life

Learning the alphabet, sight words, vocabulary, and the general rules that govern our language can be difficult for many students. When children struggle in one or more areas, it impacts their overall ability to acquire literacy skills. Helping children make the connection between what they know and the print in their environment may increase learning and provide opportunities for practicing key skills since children typically recognize and read iconic symbols as early as preschool (Clay, 1993). For instance, your child may read the McDonald's™ logo each time you drive past. Likewise, they may be able to select their favorite cereal among the hundreds of cereal choices in the grocery store. Older children may read product labels in the grocery store, road signs, and newspaper ads.

Each time you help your child link literacy to life through environmental print, you are helping to strengthen the neural pathways in their brain. Researchers recommend using logos from cereal, toothpaste, toys, favorite movies, and other recognizable household items to use as a bridge between what is known and what is new (Horner, 2005). Using puzzles with words, maps, road signs, favorite toys, food labels, and print in context from familiar products can be used to help children learn.

Here are some activities to try when using environmental print to teach literacy at home:

- Make a puzzle using the logo from your child's favorite cereal box. As your child puts the puzzle together, they will need to look at the print features and graphics.
- Have your child help collect, sort, and match coupons (Giles & Tunks, 2010).

- While driving, have your child write words they find. To add fun to the activity add categories, select words with certain letters, or instead of writing play "I Spy".
- Have children find misspelled words in their environment such as Kwik Trip™.
- Create a family tree. Have your child write the names of your family members under each picture. Provide assistance with spelling if needed.
- For little ones, play ABC I Spy when you go out for a walk or on a road trip.



Content Area Reading

You may have heard the term 'content area reading' before. So, what is it and why is it important?

Content area reading is the reading that is done in a particular subject area. It requires special knowledge and skills for before, during, and after reading in addition to general reading strategies. Content area reading ideally begins in the primary grades, and continues into the upper grades. Content area reading lays the foundation for disciplinary studies and career readiness.

There are several key comprehension strategies that can help students make sense of what they read in any content area. These skills

include activating prior knowledge, asking and answering questions, summarizing, monitoring what is known, inferring, and visualizing (Ad Lit.org, 2018). Students need to apply these skills consistently when they read. Students must consistently apply comprehension skills during content area reading. Some readers need to learn how to read in the content areas to fully benefit from instruction. If your child is struggling with any of these skills, you can help at home by using a few key resources and tips from the resources that follow.

Into the Book

Into the Book by ECB.org is an interactive program that students can use for free at home. Into the Book explains each skill, and tutors students on using the skill. It includes video with reading activities to enhance learning.

Coloring Colorado:

How to Recognize an Eye Injury

If any of these signs are present, get medical help right away:

- There is pain or trouble seeing
- The eyelid is cut or torn
- One eye does not move as well as the other
- One eye sticks out compared to the other
- The eye has an unusual pupil size or shape
- There is blood in the clear part of the eye
- The person has something in the eye that can't be easily removed

SCHOOL HEALTH NEWS

APRIL IS SPORTS EYE SAFETY MONTH

According to statistics from Prevent Blindness, more than 40,000 people are treated annually for sports related eye injuries. The good news is that almost all of these injuries can be prevented with the use of proper eye protection. The following steps can be taken to avoid eye injuries in children:

- Wear appropriate safety goggles or eye guards. In some sports, such as baseball & football, a face guard attached to the helmet should be worn. Hockey players should wear a wire or polycarbonate mask to protect the eyes.
- Regular eye glasses do not provide enough protection for the eyes. Look for protective eyewear that is labeled as ASTM approved.
- While sports account for a high number of eye injuries, bear in mind that other hobbies may also pose a risk. Flying debris from yard work or injury from sharp objects such as fishing hooks occur often. Use common sense and caution during any activity involving projectiles or other sharp objects.
- If your child does sustain an injury to the eye, seek medical help right away, even if the injury appears minor. Delaying medical attention can result in permanent vision loss or blindness.

We encourage you and your children to keep these guidelines in mind. Have fun and stay safe!

Volunteering

Drug & Weapon Free Zone

Parents, please talk to your children about what is and is not OK to bring to school. It is **not OK** to bring toy guns or knives, live or spent shells, or any other item that may remotely resemble a weapon. If a student realizes he/she has a knife, toy weapon, or anything that might resemble a weapon in their backpack, they MUST immediately tell their bus driver or adult ASAP and report to the office to have the item locked in a safe place until it can be retrieved by an adult.

This law also applies to adults carrying a knife or multi-use utility knife in a belt holder, purse, or pocket. Help keep our schools totally safe by leaving any potentially dangerous devices out of our school and off school grounds.

While the State of Wisconsin has passed a Concealed and Carry Law, restrictions to this apply while on school grounds. Stat. §* 948.605(2)(a) unless you meet the criteria for exception under state law.)
